Dear Brothers and Sisters,

On 4 August last year, the 160th anniversary of the death of the Curé of Ars, I chose to write a letter to all those priests who daily devote their lives to the service of God's people in response to the Lord's call.

Onthatoccasion, I chose four keywords – pain, gratitude, encouragement and praise – as a way of thanking priests and supporting their ministry. I believe that today, on this 57th World Day of Prayer for Vocations, those words can be addressed to the whole people of God, against the backdrop of the Gospel passage that recounts for us the remarkable experience of Jesus and Peter during a stormy night on the Sea of Galilee (cf. Mt 14:22-33).

After the multiplication of the loaves, which had astonished the crowds, Jesus told his disciples to get into the boat and precede him to the other shore, while he took leave of the people. The image of the disciples crossing the lake can evoke our own life's journey. Indeed, the boat of our lives slowly advances, restlessly looking for a safe haven and prepared to face the perils and promises of the sea, yet at the same time trusting

that the helmsman will ultimately keep us on the right course. At times, though, the boat can drift off course, misled by mirages, not the lighthouse that leads it home, and be tossed by the tempests of difficulty, doubt and fear.

Something similar takes place in the hearts of those who, called to follow the Teacher of Nazareth, have to undertake a crossing and abandon their own security to become the Lord's disciples. The risk involved is real: the night falls, the headwinds howl, the boat is tossed by the waves, and fear of failure, of not being up to the call, can threaten to overwhelm them.

The Gospel, however, tells us that in the midst of this challenging journey we are not alone. Like the first ray of dawn in the heart of the night, the Lord comes walking on the troubled waters to join the disciples; he invites Peter to come to him on the waves, saves him when he sees him sinking and, once in the boat, makes the winds die down.

The first word of vocation, then, is gratitude. Taking the right course is not something we do on our own, nor does it depend solely on the road we choose to travel. How we find fulfilment in life is more than a decision we make as isolated individuals; above all else, it is a response to a call from on high. The Lord points out our

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destination on the opposite shore and he grants us the courage to board the boat. In calling us, he becomes our helmsman; he accompanies and guides us; he prevents us from running aground on the shoals of indecision and even enables us to walk on surging waters.

Every vocation is born of that gaze of love with which the Lord came to meet us, perhaps even at a time when our boat was being battered by the storm. "Vocation, more than our own choice, is a response to the Lord's unmerited call" (Letter to Priests, 4 August 2019). We will succeed in discovering and embracing our vocation once we open our hearts in gratitude and perceive the passage of God in our lives.

When the disciples see Jesus walking towards them on the sea, they first think that he is a ghost and are filled with fear. Jesus immediately reassures them with words that should constantly accompany our lives and our vocational journey: "Take heart, it is I; have no fear" (Mt 14:27). This, then, is the second word I wish to offer you: encouragement.

What frequently hinders our journey, our growth, our choosing the road the Lord is marking out for us, are certain "ghosts" that trouble our hearts. When we are called to leave safe shores and embrace

a state of life – like marriage, ministerial priesthood, consecrated life – our first reaction is often from the "ghost of disbelief". Surely, this vocation is not for me! Can this really be the right path? Is the Lord really asking me to do this?

Those thoughts can keep growing – justifications and calculations that sap our determination and leave us hesitant and powerless on the shore where we started. We think we might be wrong, not up to the challenge, or simply glimpsing a ghost to be exorcized.

The Lord knows that a fundamental life choice – like marriage or special consecration to his service – calls for courage. He knows the questions, doubts and difficulties that toss the boat of our heart, and so he reassures us: "Take heart, it is I; have no fear!" We know in faith that he is present and comes to meet us, that he is ever at our side even amid stormy seas. This knowledge sets us free from that lethargy which I have called "sweet sorrow" (Letter to Priests, 4 August 2019), the interior discouragement that hold us back from experiencing the beauty of our vocation.

In the Letter to Priests, I also spoke about pain, but here I would like to translate the word differently, as fatigue. Every vocation brings with it a responsibility. The Lord calls us because he wants to enable us, like Peter, to "walk on water", in


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other words, to take charge of our lives and place them at the service of the Gospel, in the concrete and everyday ways that he shows us, and specifically in the different forms of lay, priestly and consecrated vocation. Yet, like Saint Peter, our desire and enthusiasm coexist with our failings and fears.

If we let ourselves be daunted by the responsibilities that await us — whether in married life or priestly ministry — or by the hardships in store for us, then we will soon turn away from the gaze of Jesus and, like Peter, we will begin to sink. On the other hand, despite our frailty and poverty, faith enables us to walk towards the Risen Lord and to weather every storm. Whenever fatigue or fear make us start to sink, Jesus holds out his hand to us. He gives us the enthusiasm we need to live our vocation with joy and fervour.

When Jesus at last boards the boat, the winds die down and the waves are calmed. Here we have a beautiful image of what the Lord can do at times of turbulence and tempest in our lives. He stills those winds, so that the forces of evil, fear and resignation no longer have power over us.

As we live out our specific vocation, those headwinds can wear us down. Here I think of all those who have important responsibilities in civil society, spouses whom I like to refer to – not without reason – as "courageous", and in a particular way



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
those who have embraced the consecrated life or the priesthood. I am conscious of your hard work, the sense of isolation that can at times weigh upon your hearts, the risk of falling into a rut that can gradually make the ardent flame of our vocation die down, the burden of the uncertainty and insecurity of the times, and worry about the future. Take heart, do not be afraid! Jesus is at our side, and if we acknowledge him as the one Lord of our lives, he will stretch out his hand, take hold of us and save us.

Even amid the storm-tossed waters, then, our lives become open to praise. This is the last of our vocation words, and it is an invitation to cultivate the interior disposition of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Grateful that Lord gazed upon her, faithful amid fear and turmoil, she courageously embraced her vocation and made of her life an eternal song of praise to the Lord.

Dear friends, on this day in particular, but also in the ordinary pastoral life of our communities, I ask the Church to continue to promote vocations. May she touch the hearts of the faithful and enable each of them to discover with gratitude God's call in their lives, to find courage to say "yes" to God, to overcome all weariness through faith in Christ, and to make of their lives a song of praise for God, for their brothers and sisters, and for the whole world. May the Virgin Mary accompany us and intercede for us.

FROM THE GOSPEL ACCORDING TO MATTHEW (14:22-33)

hen Jesus made the disciples get into the boat and precede him to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds. After doing so, he went up on the mountain by himself to pray. When it was evening he was there alone. Meanwhile the boat, already a few miles offshore, was being tossed about by the waves, for the wind was against it. During the fourth watch of the night, he came toward them, walking on the sea.

When the disciples saw him walking on the sea they were terrified. "It is a ghost," they said, and they cried out in fear. At once [Jesus] spoke to them, "Take courage, it is I; do not be afraid." Peter said to him in reply, "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water." He said, "Come." Peter got out of the boat and began to walk on the water toward Jesus. But when he saw how [strong] the wind was he became frightened; and, beginning to sink, he cried out, "Lord, save me!" Immediately Jesus stretched out his hand and caught him, and said to him, "O you of little faith, why did you doubt?"

After they got into the boat, the wind died down. Those who were in the boat did him homage, saying, "Truly, you are the Son of God."

3rd Day of TRIDUUM: A LIFE FILLED WITH PRAISE TO GOD

Introduction: In our 3rd day of triduum to the 57th World Day of Prayer for Vocations, we are called to reflect on "praise," which is important in living one's vocation. Fidelity to one's vocation is measured not by one's personal interests, but of his/her zeal for real worship of God that is reflected in his/her service and charity to his/her neighbors. This requires an interior disposition to please God always by living in constant prayer, and passion in cultivating social conditions that allows peace and harmony to thrive. Let us be reminded of how Mama Mary embraced her vocation, amidst the turmoil and sufferings that her fellow citizens experienced that time. We ask her intercession, too, so that she can teach us to offer fitting praise to the Lord by listening and bearing witness to Jesus.

PRAYERS TO SUPPLEMENT IN THE CELEBRATION OF THE 57TH WORLD DAY OF PRAYER FOR VOCATIONS

(These are some prayers that are inserted in the schema of the whole triduum of prayer on the 57th World Day of Prayer for Vocations.)

THE CHAPLET OF DIVINE MERCY:

Prayer Leader: Dear brethren, let us now turn to the merciful Jesus, who in His love has promised us to take care of us even in times of uncertainties, sicknesses, sorrow, panic, and fear. Let us all kneel, as we pray the chaplet of the divine mercy.

All: You expired, Jesus, but the source of life gushed forth for souls, and the ocean of mercy opened up for the whole world. O Fount of Life, unfathomable Divine Mercy, envelop the whole world and empty Yourself out upon us.

All: O Blood and Water, which gushed forth from the Heart of Jesus as a fount of mercy for us, I trust in You! (Repeat three times)

All: Our Father... Hail Mary... I believe in God

(This will be prayed at every large bead – Our Father/Glory Bead.)

Eternal Father, I offer you the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your Dearly Beloved Son, Our Lord, Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world.

(This will be prayed on the ten small beads of each decade.)

For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world.

(After reciting the five decades, the following will be prayed and repeated three times:)

Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world.

Concluding Prayer: Eternal God, in whom mercy is endless and the treasury of compassion — inexhaustible, look kindly upon us and increase Your mercy in us, that in difficult moments we might not despair nor become despondent, but with great confidence submit ourselves to Your holy will, which is Love and Mercy itself. Amen.

ORATIO IMPERATA ON THE COVID-19:

God our Father, we come to you in our need to ask your protection against the COVID 19 that has disturbed and even claimed lives.

We pray that you guide the people tasked to find cures for this disease and to stem its transmission.

SUGGESTED PRAYER GUIDE FOR A HOLY HOUR OF PRAYER TO END THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC

Editor's Note: No pandemic can hinder us in the celebration of the 57th World Day of Prayer for Vocations. That is why our *Kaya Idalangin* staff wishes to offer a suggested prayer guide for a holy hour prayer to end the COVID-19 pandemic. We hope that even as we stay and pray in our homes, these sets prayers may help us become aware of the healing presence of the Lord, amidst the experience of the COVID-19 pandemic around the world.

Introduction: The spread of the COVID-19 has evolved into becoming a pandemic, that is, a disease that has affected many countries, since its outbreak last December 2019. Countless lives have been afflicted with the virus, while many worked together to prevent the spread of the virus, beginning from the national government, as well as the Church, alongside with other sectors of the society. Countless measures have been taken, so that the virus may no longer contaminate other communities individuals. It is with hope that, sooner, a cure may finally be made and then administered to those affected by the virus.

Meanwhile, our Christian faith calls us to focus our attention to Jesus Christ, our Divine Healer. Throughout His mission of proclaiming the Kingdom of God, He accompanied it with powerful signs and wonders such as preaching, exorcism, and healing. He perfected the healing of our humanity by offering Himself through the Eucharist which He instituted, all the way towards His sacrifice on the Cross. There, sin and death were nailed, and new life that He created through the Cross ushered into humanity.

Through His resurrection, we believe that suffering, sin, and death no longer have the final say, but the life that Jesus Christ promised to each of us. Let us spend this hour of prayer to plead the Lord to intervene and cease the spread of the virus, and at

the same time, to ask for His mercy to forgive us and let us be reconciled to Him and to our brothers and sisters.

ALL: In the Name of the Father (+), and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

GUIDE: Father of mercy, turn your merciful eyes on us who pray to you. Look at the needs of men created and redeemed by

your love, now they are suffering because of sin and the countless crosses of life: come to our help, Father!

ALL: Come to our help, Father!

- 1. Lord, you have sent your apostles in every region of the earth that they may bring the good news to all peoples; look how until now the Word awaits to be announced to millions of people; arouse in your Church, generous souls who are ready to make know the good news of salvation, that heals and saves, in works and deeds. We pray.
- 2. Lord, you have interceded that your Church may remain united and steadfast even at the face of evil, look at the many afflictions among us, caused by the spread of the COVID-19; may we never suffer the loss of those who care for us and of those who are at the forefront fighting to prevent the spread of the pandemic. We pray.
- 3. Lord, you provide for the numerous needs of our brothers and sisters by calling many strong souls committed in spreading the Gospel by assisting the sick, in human upliftment. Grant that all those who work for your Kingdom, by encouraging and caring for the sick, be strengthened by your assurance that even in their striving to work for the cure, you are present. We pray.
- 4. Lord Jesus, you have saved us by your Cross, and you invite us to follow you by carrying our own crosses. Grant that those who suffer in body and spirit may accept their suffering with love as precious instrument of salvation. We pray.

GUIDE: Almighty and eternal, God, You sent Your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, to become our Divine Healer, who saved humanity and creation through the Cross that ushers new life. Grant us the grace to remain steadfast and hopeful that, believing in Your constant presence in Your people, the pandemic brought by the COVID-19 may cease and be averted. May we be strengthened by Your grace to also reach

out and help those who are afflicted with the virus, believing that with the Spirit which You graciously bestowed upon us, we, too may learn to experience to be humane and compassionate, just like Your Son Jesus. Amen.

ALL: In the Name of the Father (+), and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Lord Jesus, we know that You are bigger than the threat of anything, especially illnesses. Please comfort those who are living in fear: free them from the bondage that anxiety creates within. Remind them that You are still on the Throne and that You are still in control. Fully rain down the serenity that comes only from you. Help those who are living in unease to trust You in this time so that in times to come we may rest assured that You will be faithful to be with us until the end of the age. In You, Lord Jesus, we trust. Amen.
